

Dead and dangerous trees were cut down; this will continue as needed. Votee Park (under PPRAB jurisdiction, not STAB's) needs to have a replanting program to replace the ageing-out and dying trees. David suggested that when people could not replace a cut-down tree on their property, the money they pay could be used to plant trees in Votee. Although many more trees have been planted this year (though not the majestic species) than in the past, in general, Teaneck removes more trees annually than it plants.

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The BCAS Conservation Grant Program

will award a maximum of \$3,000.00 in grants for 2025.

The maximum request per proposal is \$1000.

All nonprofit 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) organizations, elementary or secondary schools, as well as local towns, counties and environmental commissions are eligible to apply and are welcome to apply for, and receive, more than 1 grant per cycle.

Grant applications must be submitted between **January 1, 2025, and February 15, 2025.** Grant applications will be reviewed by the BCAS Board of Directors and grants awarded by April 1, 2025.

ELIGIBLE PROJECTS

Eligible projects will benefit local birds, pollinators or butterflies through habitat enhancement or provide habitat for the study of nature at the elementary or secondary school level.

Habitat enhancement projects, such as habitat creation, improvement, or restoration. Examples of projects include, but are not limited to:

- Creation of butterfly, pollinator or hummingbird gardens using native plants
- Installation of nest boxes for purple martins, tree swallow, Eastern bluebirds, American kestrel, wood ducks, and/or owls
- Native trees/shrubs/wildflowers which are selected based upon suitability for wildlife habitat

Submitting a proposal

Grant proposals must provide the following

information:

- 1. Title of the project
- 2.Contact person: name, address, and e-mail
- 3. Name of organization
- 4.Leader of the organization seeking the grant (e.g., environmental commission chairperson, school principal, etc.) name, phone, and e-mail
- 5.Area: Describe the geographic area where the project will take place
- 6.Objectives: Describe the measurable goals of the project
- 7.Procedures: Explain the methods that will be used to accomplish the project objectives. Briefly detail the relevant experience or expertise of key project personnel with the species, habitat type or activity proposed. Describe any partnerships involved.

Attachments:

- 1.Budget Itemize costs for the entire project and specify the amount being requested.
- 2.Calendar List your timeline and completion date.
- 3.For non-profits, please provide a signed statement by the organization's leadership authorizing the organization to apply for the grant and enter a grant agreement if the application is accepted.
